



In the painful weeks that follow a surgery to remove Ben's shattered lower leg, his mind returns to the mountain, his impatience, that split-second decision. Will anything ever be 'normal' again?


One goal keeps him going: he will finish the climb he started.

An affirming exploration of disability, identity, and resilience in the wake of an outdoorsy teen's life-changing mountain hiking accident, *Stepping Up* sensitively examines some of the prejudices and patronising attitudes people living with disability can encounter. Told with plenty of warmth and humour to balance the grief and drama, the book never feels too heavy and is overwhelmingly positive and life affirming.
